When I do go out to have my car filled with gasoline which became the only reason why I go out basically I am actually putting my life on the stake for God knows what.

You can also read other blogs written by Iraqis living in Iraq. I think you can generate clearer idea of what's happening here. We lost our simplest rights that could remind us of being human beings.

Regarding your question about Sunni & Shia conflicts, I'd rather not answer for I don't think I have the right to talk about it and I do not want to mess it up more than it is already messed up.

We have heard and knew for sure either by friends or relatives that many Sunni were killed by Shia and many Shia were killed by Sunni for ethnic reasons but I do not know the truth anymore. Could a third party is provoking all this? A possibility!
